#### My Cup Overflows - by John Paul Moore


I've never made a fortune,

## Book Review: Stamped: Racism, Antiracism and You – by Jason Reynolds

A few years back, Dr. Ibram X. Kendi published **Stamped from the Beginning: The Definitive History of Racist Ideas in America.** It was a deeply researched chronicle of anti-Black racist ideas and their staggering power throughout American history. Jason Reynolds has taken Kendi's book and made a fast-paced narrative that is accessible to youth readers (or us adults who have less time to invest).




This book takes us through the history of racist ideas in the U.S., from Jamestown to the current day. For each era, explanations are given for how Black lives were affected by the ideologies of that time. It introduces the thinking of civil rights leaders who fought for change throughout our history. But, most importantly, it helps the reader understand why Black Americans feel as they do. I found it especially interesting to read the chapters about the parts of history that I've lived through and to see them through a different lens.

The book explains the difference between racism, assimilation and antiracism. Not only did it discredit racist ideologies, it shed much-needed light on how and why they were created. Finally, Reynolds offered

antiracist tools that we can use to expose racism and stamp it from our thoughts.

This book is on the 2022 Reading Program list in the Leadership Development category. In the 2023 list, under Education for Mission, is another book by Jason Reynolds, *Stamped (For Kids): Racism, Antiracism and You*. I haven't yet read it, but Susan Smith (Willow Glen UMC children's pastor who spoke at our celebration) highly recommended it.

#### ECRD Annual Celebration Revisited

Women from all over El Camino Real District, plus guests from other districts, met on Saturday morning, October 1, for a hybrid celebration of the year's United Women in Faith activities. Some drove to Willow Glen UMC to attend in person, while others tuned in on Zoom. The music was wonderful. The news of the good work being done by the women was heartwarming.

The morning's keynote speaker was Willow Glen's Pastor **Susan Smith** who told her life's story as a dialog with District UWF President **Debbie Ow**. Susan is her church's Pastor of Children & Family Ministries and Director of Woodhaven Preschool on the church property. Her husband Stephen is a high school history teacher and their son Casey, who was a long-time Joint Youth Ministry member, is now 21 years



old. Susan and Stephen first met in their youth group at Los Altos UMC.

Susan told about her "backward" path to her calling. She was in seminary, studying to become the youngest Diaconal Minister ordained, but then heard that the ministry would be changing in the future to the title of Deacon. So, she was ordained a Deacon and afterward felt called to that path! She has been at Willow Glen UMC since 2000 and can remain there as long as she wishes. Unlike United Methodist pastors, Deacons are not expected to be itinerate.

In addition to her pastoral duties, Susan has helped organize mission trips to build homes in Mexico and has helped set up the Village House Rotating Women's Shelter in San Jose. She formed a UMW / UWF circle for young mothers and hired a babysitter to take care of their children during their meetings. As she plans activities for the church families, she takes the advice of a babysitter who said, "Throw the spaghetti at the wall and see what sticks." If an activity isn't successful, replace it with something else. One of Susan's hobbies is knitting. She realized that children of divorce needed a place to talk, so she began a "Knit Wit" group where kids could gather in the church's fireside room to knit on small looms while talking about their fears and worries. To include the children in the morning's worship service, she set out a Prayer Box where the children could drop their prayer requests. (Every week one child prays for cheese to be served at Coffee Hour.) She set up a child-sized "Prayer Ground" table and chairs with activities for the children to do. She has noticed that sometimes the children will look up from their work when something in the sermon attracts their attention. The Children's Choir has begun meeting again, and the children sometimes serve as Worship Leaders to read the scripture. When children feel invested in their church, they are more likely to attend as adults.

### Farewell from Kathy Kim

Before I say "Goodbye" to ECRD UWF, I wanted to express my gratitude for ECRD which provided me the basis of my UMW work. I also wanted to share a little of my life and work. As I became an older adult, I find I need to reflect and reorganize my old life and get ready for the 2<sup>nd</sup> half of my life.

United Methodist Women (now United Women in Faith) have played an important role in my life. I am a retired pharmacist, Deaconess, and social worker. I came from South Korea in 1963 (59 years ago), where I had just graduated from Pharmacy School at the Chung Ang University in Seoul, Korea. With only \$50 to my name, I came to the US to study pharmacy at the University of Washington in Seattle, Washington. With minimal English and knowing no one in the U.S., my life wasn't easy at first.

I retired, in March 2004, from Kaiser Permanente Medical Group as a pharmacist after 36 years of service. I retired early at 62 due to an illness. That same year, I was commissioned as a Deaconess. Ms. Betty Purkey, a Deaconess Program officer and a Deaconess herself, helped me. The Korean UMW was also promoting the Deaconess Program at that time. Our graduating class of 2004 had five Korean Deaconesses out of 23.

I served an Assistant Dean at Ca/Nevada Conference UMW, Western Jurisdiction Core Planning group as a Treasurer, Women's Division Director from 2008-2012, and Program Advisory Group from 2012-2016.

I also served as part of the Korean American Consultative Group for the Women's Division. Rev. Hea Sun Kim, an officer of the Women's Division, helped me. She was one of the best mentors I ever had.

While I was serving as the Women's Division director, I also served the General Conference of the UMC until 2018. I served one term as a delegate and two terms as a reserve delegate from the California/Nevada Conference of UMC. It was an exciting moment for me to participate in the election of Bishops at the Jurisdiction meeting.

As a Deaconess, we are dedicated to love, justice, and service. I started the Senior Ministry at my local church, San Jose Korean UMC of Santa Clara Valley in July 2004. I donated the initial seed money to start this ministry. About 30 seniors mostly from my local church, met every Wednesday with worship service, exercise, singing, arts and crafts, and lunch, etc. We all enjoyed the program! I retired after 10.5 years and passed the baton to a capable successor. She changed the name of the program from "Senior Ministry" to "Wednesday Ministry". Young people started to come, and I became a regular attending member.

While I was working as a pharmacist at Kaiser Hospital, I went back to school, received B.A. in Psychology, Sociology, and Art at San Jose State University, and then continued for a master degree of Social Work. Unfortunately, I had to leave the program with only one requirement left, due to a divorce. My two children were in high school, so we studied together. They both are now successful business people. I hope someday they may consider attending the United Methodist Church.

Now, I need to look forward. Even though I am a retired person from UMW, I am still healthy and have plenty of work to do! I have received so much, so I want to give back to society. Here are some of my current (and planned) activities:

- I am a member of Advocacy/Justice committee for Ca/Nevada Annual Conference.
- I am still involved with local and National Korean American UMW (advisory committee person for the National Korean American network). I would like to recruit more young Korean American members.
- I continue to work for Domestic Violence Advocate groups for victims as I have for over 20 years.
- I would like to set up a shelter someday. I am a Real Estate Investor and I manage my own properties, so I hope to put these skills to good use.
- I am a globe trotter. I travel a lot, and I went on many Ubuntu<sup>1</sup> Journeys with UMW members. I usually combine mission trips with my traveling. I just came back from the Danube River Cruise by Viking. It was a good time for European travel, as the dollar was quite strong, compared to the last time I was there.

As I leave the district team, I wanted to share the following verse (that has guided me) with you:

**I Thessalonians 5:16:** "Be joyful always. Pray continually; give thanks in all Circumstances, for this is God's will for you in Christ Jesus".
